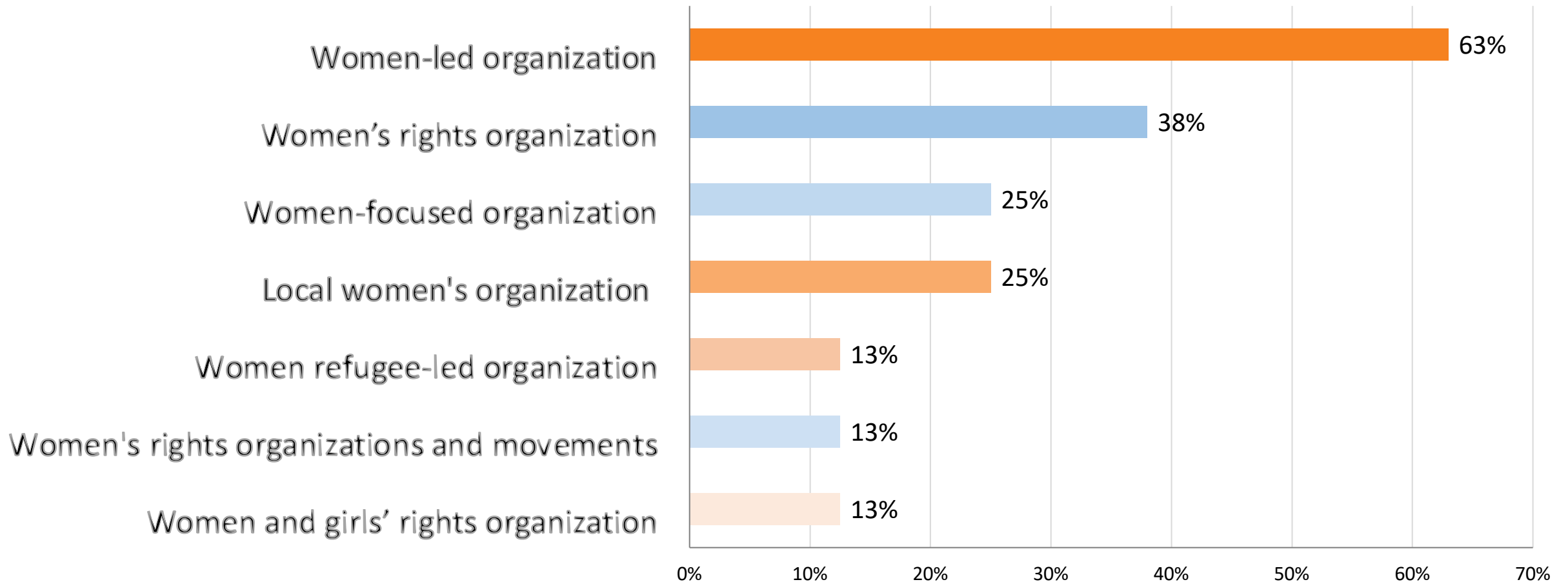

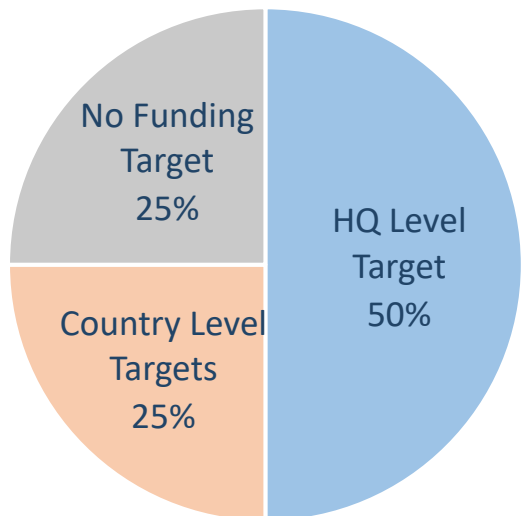

There is significant variation in the **terms** used



- ▶ Terminology and definitions are not consistent across agencies
- ▶ Agencies often do not have terms and definitions outlined in policy

FOR LOCAL ACTORS

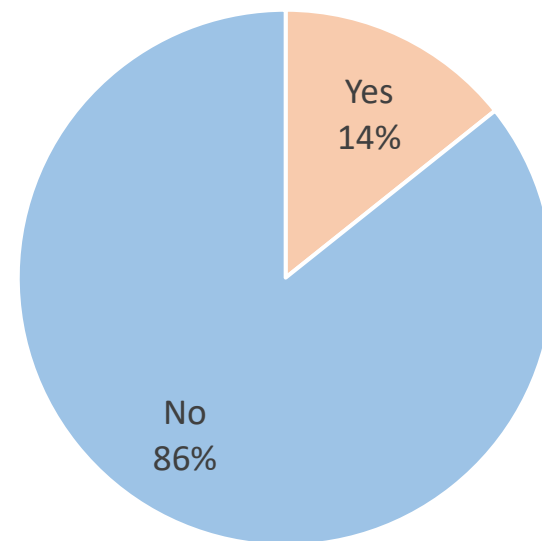


Four of eleven agencies have a funding target of 25% or more at the HQ level

Good Practice: The Global Protection Cluster (of which the GBV AoR is part of) has set a 25% target for HRP funding to local actors (for protection and GBV response plans)

One agency has a WLO funding target (OCHA) "By end of 2022, at least 30% of CERF funding for GBV is sub granted to women led/women's rights organizations "

Good Practices: UNFPA , UNICEF and UNHCR are currently amending their systems (this may also be addressed by other agencies joining the UNPP in the future)

* Excluding UN Women

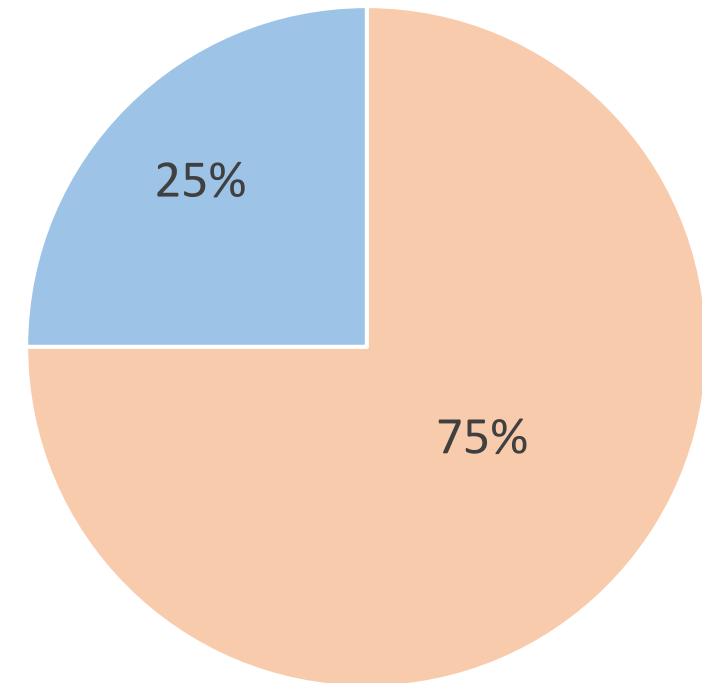
4 funding targets for local actors, 1 for WLOs

Most agencies (75%, 6/8) have made various WLO commitments beyond funding in the areas of - participation in coordination mechanisms, leadership and decision making, and capacity strengthening including on PSEA

For most agencies this represents CtA Commitments (63%, 5/8)

Good Practice: Two agencies, OCHA and UNHCR, have targeted commitments / benchmarks in the areas of participation and decision making

'Soft-touch' approaches to prioritizing WLOs

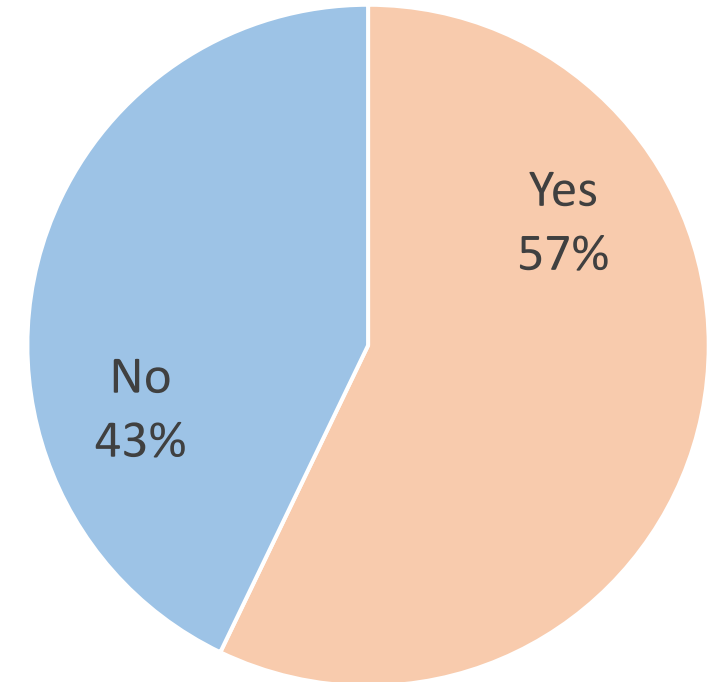
WLO Prioritization

No agency has a corporate policy / selection criteria (i.e., weighting) in place which formally preferences WLOs

Several agencies have released guidance or have systems which identify WLOs (57%, 4/7), yet these are 'soft-touch' approaches

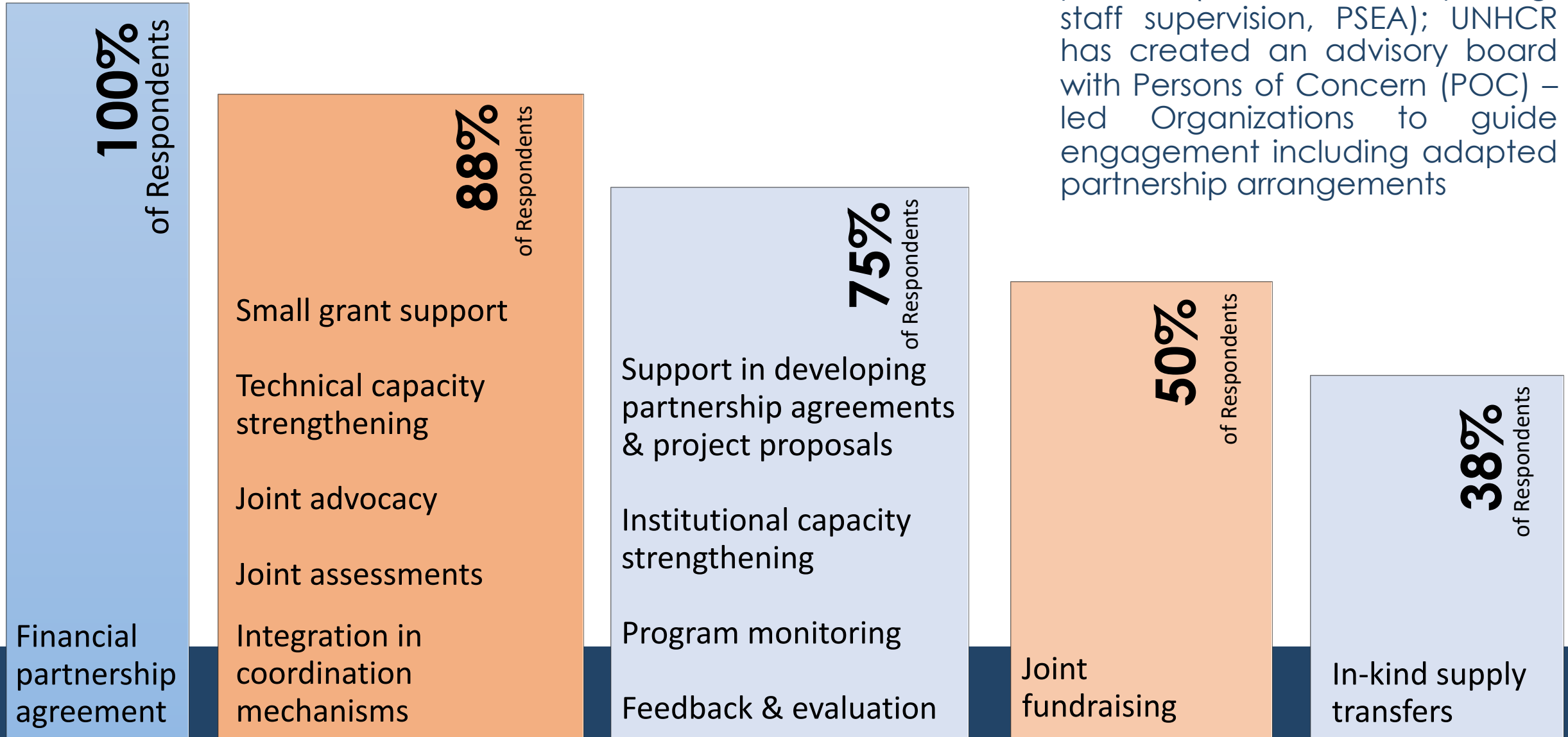
Good Practices: UNFPA released a guidance note on WLO engagement including a checklist, OCHA's Gender Contact Group advises pooled funds policy to support WLOs.

Noting: OCHA has committed 30% of CERF funding for GBV (see slide 5), UN Women was excluded from this calculation as all funding goes to Women's rights / WLOs

ENGAGING WLOs THROUGH...



Good Practices: IOM strengthens administrative capacity of partners (i.e., financial, reporting, staff supervision, PSEA); UNHCR has created an advisory board with Persons of Concern (POC) – led Organizations to guide engagement including adapted partnership arrangements

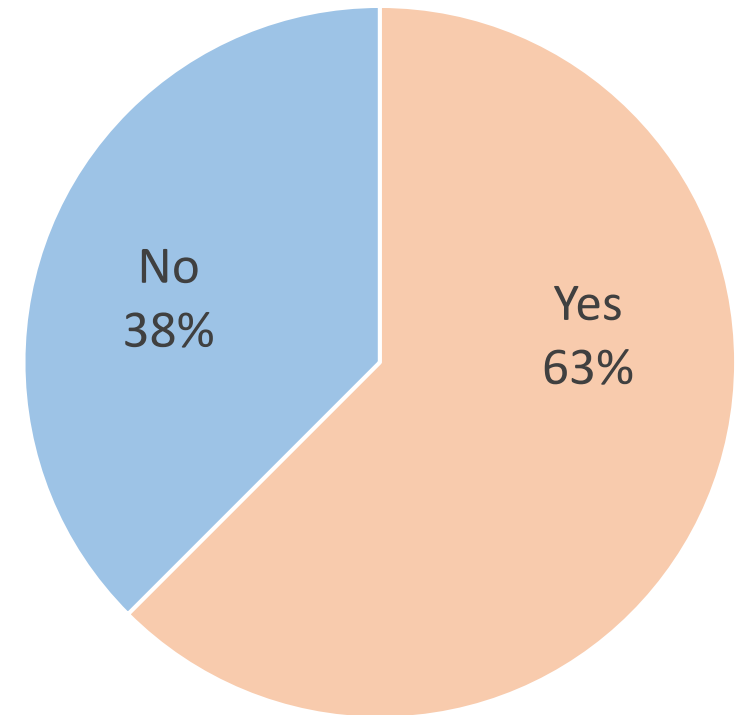
Most partners have / develop **guidance** to strengthen WLO partnerships

Currently 3 agencies (37%) have WLO related policy or guidance in place (UN Women, OCHA, UNFPA)

Four agencies (50%) have studies underway and/or drafting guidance

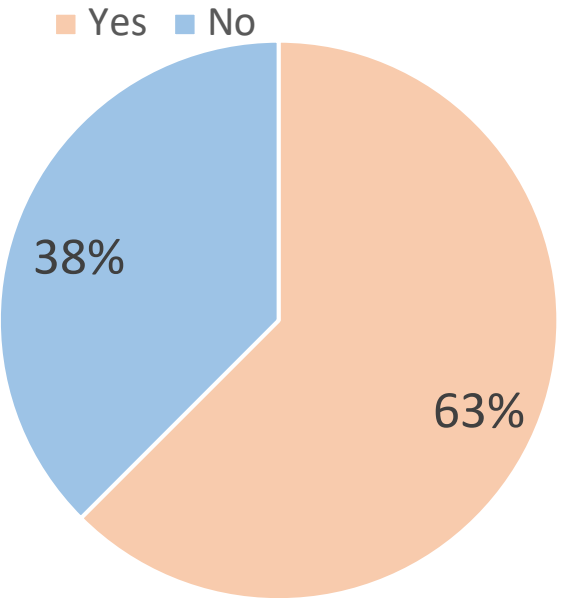
Good Practices: Inclusion of WLO in the global governance structure of the GBV AoR is currently under review; agencies conducting studies to draft guidance on improved WLO engagement (UNHCR, ELRHA); UNFPA mapping of WLOs at country level; UNICEF developing a partner assessment tool.

WLO RELATED POLICY OR GUIDANCE IN PLACE



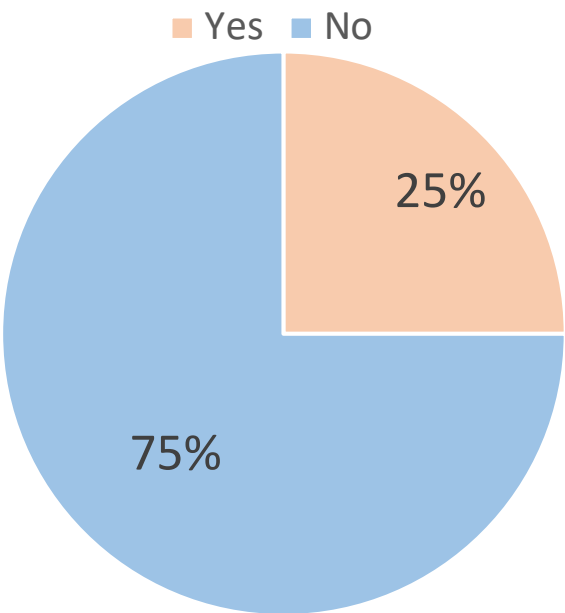
More than half use the UNITED NATIONS PARTNER PORTAL (UNPP)

Five agencies (63%) are using the UNPP

UNPP WLO Tagging



Only 2 agencies (25%) will track WLO funding through the UNPP

This is a critical concern as unclear terms and definitions, as well as partnership / financial tracking systems which do not capture WLOs, remain key barriers to expanding support to WLOs

Capacity is developed through partnership systems, grant making and mentoring

All agencies reported supporting technical capacity strengthening, and compliance

Capacity strengthening **may be included** in the programme document as valid programme costs for **most** agencies

Organizational capacity strengthening remains ad-hoc

No agency has a policy / plan with clear support for organization capacity strengthening

Mentoring approaches remain ad-hoc at the country office level

No agency has a policy/programme which supports this in a formal or standardized manner

Good Practices: UNFPA has a grant scheme to strengthen the capacity of non-implementing partners (up to \$30,000 USD); Elhra and UNHCR have innovation funds targeting WLOs and is in the process of developing a grant scheme; GBV AoR REGA provide coaching for co-coordination roles

Barriers for partnering with WLOs: Systems, funding requirements, capacity, external factors

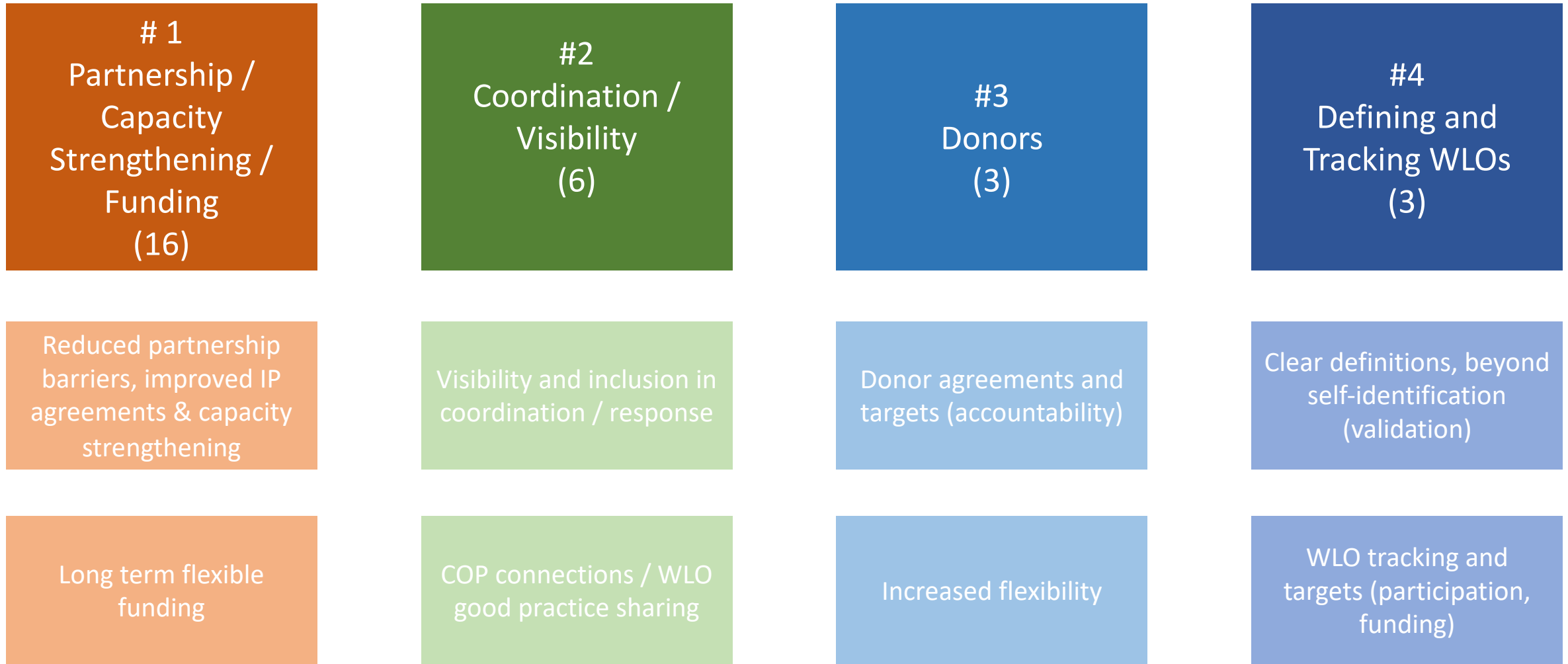
